1977 has been a good year in the ministry of the Hamilton Square Baptist Church.

All who visit the church now receive a personal letter from the pastor through the help of several who now volunteer their time. Our attendance in the morning services has gone up from an average of 88 to 114 and that of the evening service from 38 to 54. There has also been an increase in our Sunday School attendance. Souls have been saved and it has been thrilling to see God's people growing in their spiritual lives and in their service to the Lord.

The future is bright and challenging; doors are beginning to open, and the challenge will be for us as a church to enter these doorways of opportunity and serve the Lord with all our might. It looks very much like 1978 will be the year when our radio ministry will be established. We will be preparing to reach out by mail and telephone to areas that first looked like they were closed.

Brethren, let us rise up and build a great work for God!

JUNIOR CHURCH

The first half of last year was a prosperous time for our Junior Church in that some fifteen decisions for salvation were made and a good attendance of twenty to thirty children was maintained. Also, this year, after having gone through the training program on Child Evangelism, presented by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gibbs, we began our own incentive program. In this program the children gain points in the form of paper "crowns" for various types of participation in the church program which they bank and use to buy good healthy Christian literature in our "Junior Church Bookstore." This has resulted in a great enthusiastic participation and cooperation of the children in such things as memory work, retaining the scripture lessons taught, and passing out tracts.

The Junior Church is somewhat patterned after a regular church service, but geared down to a Junior's comprehension and retention level, with children taking active parts, such as ushering, special numbers, testimonies, and even leading in prayer or song leading.

Each service is centered around a lesson from the Bible and is closed with a brief challenging message on salvation and faithful Christian living. This past year we have completed teaching a series of lessons on the life of Christ, The Parables of Christ, and Elijah and Elisha, and we are now presenting lessons through the book of Genesis, chapter by chapter.

Our greatest need and request for prayer is for more workers that would regularly visit our children and make contacts, especially on the Naval Base of Treasure Island.

This team is composed of Dr. Andrew Wood, Director of the Shepherds Home for the mentally retarded, and Steve and Butch who are residents of the Home. Our Sunday School offering on the third Sunday of each month is designated for this Home. In March we had Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gibbs with us from Southern California who work with children through the organization of Child Evangelism. They ministered to us in a week-end training session which was most informative and helpful in knowing how to deal with children. Rev. Grant Rice, who is in the ministry of establishing new churches throughout our own home land was with us in April. Chaplain Dan Bannan, who is now serving his country in Hawaii, spoke to us on a Wednesday evening in May. We had the privilege of hearing Glenn Gardiner, who is a graduate of our Seminary and now serving the Lord in new church work in the very North East corner of our country, during the month of July. In August Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Donner, who are former members of Hamilton Square and are now serving with Trans World Radio, were with us for a Wednesday evening to acquaint us with their ministry. Dr. Jacob Chelli, President of the Berean Baptist Bible College in Bangalore, India, spoke to us on a Sunday morning in September, telling us of the many needs of that land and in particular of the needs of the College. Those who attended prayer meeting in October and were privileged to hear Cynthia Mikhail, were indeed thrilled with her presentation of the work she and her husband do under Baptist World Mission in the Holy Land. During the year of 1978 there will be opportunity to hear more of our missionaries as they come to minister to us. You as indivuals are the loser if you do not put forth a special effort to be in attendance each time a missionary is to speak.
