#### **PUTTING ANGER & BITTERNESS TO REST**

As you go through each lesson, look up the Bible verses and answer the questions in the blanks provided. When you are finished with this lesson you and your mentor will meet to discuss your answers and any questions you may have. This is not a pass/fail test, so answer honestly as you understand things. We want you to understand, not just to give the "right" answer.

Because we live in a sin-cursed world populated by sinners, it is impossible for us to expect to escape life unscathed by the effect of other people's sin on our life.

But that does not give you the right to remain angry and bitter.

**8.** *Anger* is a flame up that flares up and soon dies away. Bitterness is something far more dangerous. Sometimes it is just plain sinister. It burns inwardly like a long-term furnace of emotional hurt, fear or rage.



SOMEONE HAS DESCRIBED BITTERNESS AS A POISONOUS PILL **YOU** SWALLOW HOPING **SOMEONE ELSE** WILL DIE.



In other words, bitterness hurts you more than it hurts anyone else (including the person or circumstance that has made you bitter).

When we become bitter towards another person, that person may never have any idea that we are angry with them! They may have wronged us unintentionally. But even if they have sinned against you intentionally, they just don't care that they hurt you.

BITTER — In general, something disagreeable to the sense of taste ...The Old Testament mentions bitter herbs (Exodus 12:8), bitter grapes (Deuteronomy 32:21), and bitter water, which comes by its bitterness either naturally ("Marah," Exodus 15:23) or because of a divine curse (Numbers 15:17ff).

Metaphorically, bitterness can express desperation, pain, despondency (Genesis 27:34; Ruth 1:20; I Samuel 1:10; Matthew 26:75), and even enmity (Psalm 64:3; Acts 8:23).

Life sometimes hurts. At times God allows things to happen that are beyond our control. Sometimes pain comes to our lives as the result of the sinful actions of other people. When we feel as though we have been mistreated by God or by others, a sense of bitterness or resentment can settle into our hearts. Resentment and bitterness can destroy us!

**RESENTMENT** — a feeling of bitterness towards someone, usually as a result of their actions or words Resentment is possible against God or against other people.

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

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
James 3:14-15 clearly describes "bitter envy and strife" as being "earthly, sensual, and devilish." Such things have no place in a Christian's life!

That is why the writer of Hebrews encourages us to live at peace with God and with others. Bitterness always hurts *us*, but it doesn't hurt *only* us. It hurts many other people we know and love.



**Hebrews 12:14-15** "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord: Looking diligently lest any man fail of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, and thereby many be defiled."

#### **GETTING OVER BITTER FEELINGS IS NOT AN EASY TASK.**

**PROVERBS 18:19** "A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city: and their contentions are like the bars of a castle."

#### THREE IMPORTANT STEPS IN YOUR BATTLE AGAINST BITTERNESS

- 1. **RECOGNIZE BITTERNESS AS A SERIOUS SIN.** I John 3:15 "Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer: and ye know that no murderer hath eternal life abiding in him." Bitterness is hatred! Hatred leads to murder! Murder begins in the heart. Do not allow this seed to take root!
- 2. **CONFESS THE SIN OF BITTERNESS TO GOD** You are not responsible for what others do to you, but you are responsible for your reaction.
- 3. **FORGIVE THE ONE(S) WHO HAVE SINNED AGAINST YOU** This may not always be possible to do in person, but be sure to do it in your own heart. You can't go forward with a joyful heart until you do.

THE BATTLE AGAINST BITTERNESS will be a prolonged battle with some ups and downs, but if you are persistent in the fight with God's help you will experience great joy and victory in due time.
